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A LETTER FROM LADY A

Oftentimes, we get saved, go to church, hear, and even say words or phrases without actually being clear of their meaning and what they should communicate and convey in our lives. May this resource assist you when you hear and wonder, “What does that even mean?” And to allow you to feel confident and secure in your salvation journey because you hear and are able to actually understand how it impacts your understanding of the Word of God and your life.

The faith-based terms and phrases included are not all, but they cover some that are common or frequently used. I also include some that you will hear from Destiny Center House of Worship (DCHOW, pronounced D.C.-HOW) leadership and support staff.

Remember, the goal is to equip you with clarity, insight, and understanding so that you feel prepared, confident, and secure in what the terms mean, as well as provide and establish within you.

May the definitions, written in layman terms, support you to live saved and changed, confident that you belong and fit right in with the body of Christ so that you are resilient as you navigate new life in and with Christ—the good times and the challenging ones.

Note: This is NOT set up like a dictionary, but I am alphabetizing the words by first letter only. May salvation be a destiny centered thing for you as you learn a new language and live a new life.

A

Authority: This is a gift given by God Himself as a direct result of being His child. Jesus is Lord of all and holds all authority over heaven and earth. You may know authority as one being over you. In salvation, the Lord is over us, but He doesn't abuse His power. His Lordship over us is a privilege. He is seated on the throne and the earth is His footstool. Because He is high and lifted up, as His child, you have been given authority over your mistakes, issues, failures, any opposition, temptations, over all things except God. It's a rightful place that gives you confidence as you navigate life.

Adornment: The way in which God wants to enhance and transform you. It happens with an inner wealth of peace, hope, love, cleansing, mending, and maturity of heart and mind. It overflows into the external facets of how you show up as a person and in life.

Abide: This is a biblical term that instructs us to stick and stay with Jesus. It is you living in the mind, heart, and magnificence of all of God. This is to align your life so that everything you do, as well as your ability to experience deliverance from daily frustrations, a life filled with purpose is by choosing to remain united in fellowship with God. You do so deliberately, knowingly, and habitually. This depicts the importance and necessity of your quality of life because you allow yourself to learn how to take residence in your life-giving source. Consider abiding in Jesus as a personal commitment that enables you to be both rested and productive, focused and fueled to have a legacy and lineage that are of quality, substance, and assurance.

A Godly/Kingdom woman or man: This is a way to describe a person who has given their life to Jesus but also who chooses to live in ways that indicate their growth and maturity. When you meet a godly or kingdom woman or man, you should see them model or exemplify values that agree with the instructions of God's word more than cultural terms or personal preference.

A man or woman after God's own heart: This phrase reveals a person who truly wants to please God, not from perfection, but wants to be a person who allows God to course-correct, discipline, and guide them to be better. They genuinely desire to live a lifestyle that honors Jesus. As a result, they willingly turn from ways that are unpleasant to God when they are either corrected, disciplined, or are aware of their own choice that does or does not please God.

Amen: This is a word that means that you agree with what God's Word says, either spoken aloud from a biblically based sermon at church, a teaching, or private whispers to your heart as you read devotional books and Scripture.

When you say amen, you come into agreement with God having the final say regarding your situation, circumstance, dilemma, lifestyle, etc. This is a word you don't want to use casually. Be aware of what you are agreeing with when you use this term.

Ask and you shall receive: This is a biblical phrase that encourages you not to be intimidated by asking God for what you need. It's like the phrase you hear, "A closed mouth doesn't get fed." You want to be a man or woman who goes to God about your needs, desires, and aspirations. But you also trust that He will give you according to His plans and purposes for your life. Oftentimes, it doesn't come packaged the way you think. However, knowing God's character will help you believe that He will provide for you at the perfect time and in a variety of ways.

A closer look within: This phrase leads you into self-reflection. It should propel you to look beyond the surface of things and into the motive behind them to examine your heart's intent. Why do you do the things you do? But also for you to be open to what God wants to show you about yourself—good, bad, and ugly. Not to scorn you, but to make you mature, wise, and better. For He is the One who searches out the heart.

Anointed: This is a word used to indicate God has gifted someone to fulfill what God created them to do on Earth. The meaning is to show that strength doesn't come from that person but from the power of God through that person. You are able to hear and see the presence of God through them. This person should honor God in both personal life and public duties.

Assurance: This is a word used in faith that reminds and encourages you that you can be certain that you are forever in the care, love, and provision of God the Father. You can find rest instead of panic, and ease instead of being overwhelmed, when you allow yourself to believe and be rooted in the oath of Jesus to always be with you no matter what you're facing, dealing with, or going through. He is faithful to be who He is; neither you nor your situation can change who He is. He's got you!

Bold: This is a term to describe a person of faith who is not afraid or cowers from doing hard and God-honoring things. This is a quality that a person of faith should portray in order to obey the instructions of God through their lifestyle practices, values, and boundaries. This person is also courageous and brave in the face of adversity.

Become: This is the ability for you to have forward movement in who you are. You should permit yourself to discover more and more of the person God has always known you to be. He is calling you to be that person He formed in your mother's womb. Think of it as a gradual progression of your womanhood/manhood, mending and maturing from hurts, wounds, negative thinking,



insecurities, ways, and relationships that no longer serve your greater good in the quality of who you are or where God is taking or leading you.

Believer: This is a term to communicate someone who has received salvation through Jesus Christ.

Belief: This biblical term is to indicate what you put your hope in. Belief is a revealer of the heart and mind as well as our relationship and fellowship with Jesus. As a believer, our belief should be rooted in the truth, promises, and possibilities that we have in the Lord, Jesus Christ, as nothing is too hard for Him. Belief will also be needed in yourself... to do what seems hard as He instructs you to do and to do the holy things you've never done before. It is all possible when your belief is anchored in Christ. He helps us to do what He calls us to accomplish.

Beauty: This term, when used in the faith arena, goes deeper than outward appearance. It is the beauty of the heart, mind, thoughts, speech, and sincerity of actions. This type of beauty is cultivated the closer you are to God, and the more intimate your relationship is with Him. It happens when you allow such close proximity to nurture your human nature, recondition your habits, default, and add substance or depth to any shallow approaches to life, relationships, manhood/womanhood, and yourself—often referred to as inner beauty. This beauty is not that of a woman who is 'pretty-ugly' – pretty on the outside but whose attitude, character, motives, morals, and manners are a mess (ugly). For women, this type of beauty reveals that you are outwardly beautiful because you resemble and reflect the beauty of your interior.

Brilliance: This is a term that you may have heard in the world. However, it is important to note where it comes from. When you hear this term used by leadership or support staff, it is rooted in the unique construct of a person whom God created. We are talking about the innate ability given by your Creator to be used on Earth. This brilliance is not superficial; it has been placed within you for a purpose - your destiny. It's God giving you permission to unlock it properly so that He can position you to shine and be light in dark places, game changers in the world.

Beautifully Woven: To be beautifully woven is to be a descriptor for a child of God who remains in the hands of the heavenly Father. Although you may have been undone by life, situations, and circumstances in the past, as well as, having your fair share of suffering, challenges, and hardship. However, you believe that you can find refuge and safety in and with a loving and faithful God. As woven, you become knit together and seamless with our Savior. As a result, you can realize you have security, assurance, safety, confidence, and all things beneficial in Salvation. To be beautifully woven is to be supported, sustained, secure, and satisfied by being held together by the hands, heart, guidance, and voice of God.

C

Cast your cares on the Lord: This biblically based phrase is to remind you that although you may have been raised to suck it up and push through, you don't have too. Although you may carry or bury your inner issues well, you have permission from heaven not to be a superman or super-woman. You can release what is troubling you, concerning you, bothering you, and frustrating you by talking, telling, and crying them out, if necessary, to Jesus. When you do this, you also communicate to yourself and God that you believe He cares about every detail of your life and is the first person you rely on for help, comfort, and to vent. You don't have to hold it all in. He is your safe place, secret keeper, and wise counsel.

Calm and quiet your soul: This is a biblical phrase that teaches and reminds you that you don't have to be all over the place, anxious all the time, overly emotional, or pent up with unresolved anger. It is a reminder that God has given you the ability and capacity to regulate your emotions, thoughts, feelings, and mindset in a way that soothes the chaos and confusion so that you re-establish yourself moment by moment, allowing you to experience yourself in soundness and sobriety. In other words, "relax and release" all the tension going on within you.

Covenant: This is a biblical term that depicts the reason for Jesus to walk the Earth, die, and rise again. To establish an everlasting seal of protection and promises, to give you an inheritance like no other. A covenant is an agreement made between you and God the Father when you accept Him as Lord and Savior over your life. The covenant is ongoing for the rest of your life because it originated in the blood of Jesus shed on the Cross – which is why we celebrate Easter, which around here, we call, Resurrection Sunday. Covenant gives you the power to rise and be resilient with the help of Jesus. You are in a covenant agreement and it goes both ways. It's good to know the value of the covenant.

Communion: This is a biblical acknowledgment of Jesus's death and resurrection. This is eating a cracker and drinking juice as a symbolic meaning of you eating His body that was bruised and battered for you to live free from guilt, shame, sin, and anything that keeps you low or down. As well as to drink of His blood, which gives you all the power to rise and live free from sin, beyond barriers, limitations, stinking thinking, etc., just as He rose from the grave with all power.

Close communion: This is a phrase used to encourage you to live and do life up close and personal with God rather than far off and distant. Close communion is to invite God into the details and decisions of your daily life, as

well as to know God in great detail about who He is and what He desires for both you and your lifestyle. Close communion breaks routine or checklists. It's ongoing, perpetual, consistent, and intentional to go deeper in learning, discovering, and developing you and yourself in God. Also as intimacy with God. Close communion is obtained when we Abide.

D

Daughter of God: This is a faith-based term that communicates to whom you belong as well as who you are. It is a seat of office that you now have when you choose to believe in Jesus. This term distinguishes you from life before and positions you for a new life. From this seat, all else is now filtered through. Your identity just got a makeover. You have to choose to discover yourself daily from this seat. (Same meaning for Sons of God)

Delivered: This is a biblical term that tells you what God is capable of and what He did for the people in the Bible. It is what He wants to do for you as well. To take you out of environments that mean you no good, to take you out of brokenness, bitterness, hurt, pain, self-inflicted wounds, residue, and conditions that confine you. The goal of being delivered is the evidence of positioning in the place of being no longer bound or easily influenced by what once held you hostage, captive, or confined—emotionally, mentally, physically (locations), or spiritually.

Development: This is the process in which you grow, advance, change, and become someone who is mending and maturing as a whole. This should be something in which you continually invest in yourself so that you are healing, healthy, and advancing in the way you think of things, in your motives, manners, movements, processing, and values for yourself. Consider this a mission of your man or womanhood. To be developed both spiritually and personally.

Divine: This is to inform you of the nature of Christ. God is divine—set apart, Lord of all, holy, pure, extremely good, pleasant, and enjoyable.

Deity: This is a word to express the fullness of God represented in more than one form: He is Father, Lord, and Holy Spirit. This is to explain that God is immortal and the all-encompassing One. There is depth and dimension to God that you should desire to discover and delight in.

Destiny: This is a faith-based term that explains to you a greater outlook for your life. It is the plans of God that are greater than the plans you may have for yourself. Your daily decisions should be to agree with God's plans and

purpose for your life because they shape your destiny, which is what He has already written concerning you. At DCHOW, we develop and disciple you to have forward movement into the plans of God for you in all areas of your life..

Disciple: Upon salvation, you are forever learning how to live a life that is dedicated and committed to following Jesus' teachings, word, and way of life. You follow His example- surrendering your own way of doing things to obey the way He gives. You learn and do what the Bible instructs as a way of life.

Devotion: Your ability to intentionally and consciously choose to demonstrate loyalty, love, and affection for God on a personal level. This can be done through prayer, reading, worship, and lifestyle practices.

Dominion: This is a biblical term to remind you of who God is. This is to know He is in control, holds all power, and is the ruler of all things. But because you are made in His image, you also have control and power over how you navigate life and its challenges. Dominion is to let you know to tap into God's Spirit living in you so that you don't get dragged by life or coast through it, but conquer in life. You have power over your circumstances; they don't have power over you. But remember, God holds all power; you don't run Him; you experience His rule in the midst of your circumstances so that nothing you go through defeats you.

Don't fret: This is a term used to remind you that you don't have to be intimidated, distraught, or become undone by the twists and turns of life, your own journey, or the uncertainty of the future. When you feel yourself worrying or afraid, bothered by all the things or bad news, you can choose to filter that feeling by knowing who is in control and who walks with you through it all—His name is Jesus.

Deny yourself: This is a biblical term to remind you that you don't always know what's best for you. You can be irrational, impulsive, arrogant, prideful in your feelings, etc. In that case, you have a decision to make: lead yourself into trouble, naiveness, issues, regret, or deny yourself so that God can lead you in that exact moment. You pause and pray, "Father, help me, guide me, and lead me into what is beneficial." Destiny gets birthed here in the pause, God giving you strength to deny yourself and obey Him.. (Refer to the definition of destiny.)



Eternity: This is a biblical term to inform you of your future home. You should live life with your future home in mind. The place God has prepared for you to live with Him forever and ever and ever is heaven. There is also a place where you can put yourself because you ignored and denied God all your earthly life—hell.

Faith: A biblical term for those who believe that puts our trust in God's ability. To have faith is to believe beyond what you can see, sense, or feel because you are relying on the faithfulness, power, Spirit, and love of God.

Fasting: This is a way of life that positions a believer to deny themselves and have close communion with the Lord—seeking Him in a more intense way. Fasting is a cleansing method that purifies aspects of the flesh (human nature) that may be addicted or overindulgent in certain things that seem normal because it's what you're used to. Fasting also helps to break any interference between us and God. When you fast you open up to a realm greater than you and experience the strength of God in a different way. At DCHOW, we fast frequently all throughout the year with intention, a clear focus, and as a way of life. According to the Bible, some things only happen as a result of prayer AND fasting.

F

God's will: This is a biblical phrase that indicates the path that will lead you to be better, wiser, and positions you to remain in covenant agreement. God's will is found in the instructions of His Word, the Bible, and in how He guides you in decision making.

God's got it: This is a phrase used to remind and encourage yourself that there is greater help than you or humans.

Holy: This is a biblical term that teaches you something that is contrary to a lifestyle that you've always known. It is a depiction of God that is pure, uncontaminated, and is a right standing all of the time. Holiness is what we are called to be, just as Christ is. In daily life, that means you are being made over, becoming a man/woman who values being an example of God. Holiness is what sets you apart as a person because your state of being washed, cleansed, and purified - moment by moment. Yes, it is possible!

Heart posture: The condition or motive of your heart. It can be postured towards the Lord and His righteousness or not. We develop you to have a heart posture of holiness and surrender.

Holy Spirit: This is a deity of The Lord. When Jesus died, He left the Comforter, which is His Holy Spirit. The Holy Spirit is the essence of God that reveals,

comforts, and accompanies us all the days of our lives. His Spirit, which is holy, now lives in you. As a result, you have the power of God on the inside and the ability to live pure.

K

Kingdom: A place that is ruled and governed by a higher power. The kingdom of God is to display that you are ruled by the power of God's instructions. Your beliefs, heart, and lifestyle reveal the kingdom that you live in. Think of it as your governing system. There is also a kingdom of darkness, which reveals that a person does not live under the kingdom of God's power but of their own or of Satan (demonic activity). There is a difference, but the lines can be blurred, which is why every word in this resource is important. At DCHOW, you are developed to live life for the Kingdom of God. We believe in you!

Kingdom femininity: This is a term I have coined to describe femininity and womanhood that is aligned with God's kingdom (see previous definition of Kingdom). It has a sound, feel, look, and encounter that allows you to be set apart as a woman. Men, this kind of woman is what is Biblical Womanhood.

Life, and life more abundantly: This is a biblical phrase of promise for those who hope in Christ Jesus. This is a portion of life that allows you to experience yourself and life navigation from ease, inner wealth, stability, security, assurance, and rest that the world can't give you; it only comes from close communion and belief in Jesus Christ and living under His Lordship.

Lordship: This is a biblical term to reveal and remind you who governs and is the head of your life. Jesus Christ is also the Lord. It's in the Bible and is a part of salvation, confession, and belief. Your life indicates that Jesus is your leading man and authority in everything you do and entertain, as well as what you do not.

L

Only believe: This is a biblical phrase to remind your heart, mouth, and mind to think about the capability of God. There are limitless possibilities for those who believe without wavering. You can also pray to God to help you with your unbelief—the things that cause you to doubt, stumble, question, or settle.

Obey: This is to do what God instructs you to do. Not from anger, but from willingness. To obey becomes desirable when you know it is for your good and

aligns you with your destiny.

Obedience is better than sacrifice: This is a biblical phrase that informs us of God's heart and how He views our actions and intentions. To obey God is better than what we sacrifice while obeying.

Portion: This is a term that helps you see what God has in store for you. Portion is what is provided for you as an inheritance, which you received as a gift when you accepted Jesus to be the Lord and Savior of your life.

Promise: This is also a biblical term that reminds, reassures, and encourages you of what God will do in your life. Promises are throughout the Bible. The promises of God cannot be broken, for He cannot lie. God's promises are real and are forever.

Patience: The ability to steward times of waiting with confidence in Christ.

Pray about it: This is a phrase that should alert you to seek Jesus, to talk to Jesus, and to invite Jesus into your midst – listening to what He reveals. Take all things before Him, great or small. Be sure to tune in to our Prayer Series where Pastor Piper breaks down the meaning of prayer and how it is significant to our daily lives. (Found under our Development Tab on the website)




Righteousness: This is a biblical term for a way of life practiced by a believer in Jesus Christ. When you seek God's will to be conveyed in your thoughts, actions, and purpose for living, applied by faith, you are in right standing with the Lord.

Reverence: This is when you have profound awe, respect, and honor for God as well as His Word and ways. Reverence is outwardly demonstrated in how you live your life, conduct yourself, and treat other people that reveals your heart posture for the Lord. Reverence and upholds holiness.

Revelation: This is a biblical term that depicts the end state as well as divine insight that comes from God the Father. Revelation gives you clarity and aha moments inspired by God Himself revealing things to you. Also a book in the Bible where God gave John insight into the days to come - the end times-

highlighting the choices believers and unbelievers must make in the course of our lives that have far reaching implications for eternity.

Saved: This is a biblical term that communicates that you have made a choice in life to give your life to Jesus. This is now communicating that you are not your own anymore but are now adopted by royalty to be a child of God. You believe and confess that Jesus is the Son of Man and now desire to live a new life in and with Him.

Surrender: This is a biblical term that instructs you to let go of control. This happens when you practice loosening the grip you have on life and decisions concerning your life. Especially when you want to make things happen on your own. Surrender is to yield and make way for God to lead you in what to say, where to go, how to be, how to respond, react, think, etc. Consider this as the secret sauce of your manhood/womanhood.

Submit: This is a biblical term that reminds and instructs you to honor the person in the place of authority or leadership. Offer your insight and state your opinion, respectfully, but also allow that person to have the final say. You will also hear this as 'submission' in marriage. The wife submits to the husband. I can do a whole teaching on this because we often miss the beauty of this biblical instruction when we see it from a human lens. Men, you submit to the Lord as an act of obedience and acknowledgement of His place in your life to lead and guide you so you can lead and guide your family from His wisdom instead of your own.

Sacrifice: This is a biblical term that instructs and reminds you that your life is not your own. Jesus died for you, and you must remember to learn how to live without being selfish or self-centered. It is to be considerate and mindful of others, but most importantly, of Jesus. It may be a sacrifice to have to say no to something you want to say yes.

Spiritual maturity: This is a biblical phrase that instructs you to grow up and set childish things aside. This is the art of learning the ways of Christ and applying them to your life as well as your emotions, thought process, how you are as a person. It is to grow in the understanding, wisdom, knowledge, and love of God concerning you. Consider it the method of your life. You are capable of doing this. DCHOW builds you to be spiritually mature.



Set apart: This is a Biblical term that distinguishes you from the conduct and intent of the former way in which you used to live, or currently live. To be set apart is to begin to spiritually mature, obey God; it naturally happens as you posture your heart and mind to be a disciple of Him, being developed in His ways and applying His truth.

Spirit & Soul: These are two separate biblical terms that I am defining together. They indicate the making of your inner person that animates your physical actions (body). You are composed of spirit, soul, and body. Oftentimes we get the order wrong - leading with the soul of our emotions, will, and intellect. When God's word and Spirit is to get us into the proper order of spirit, soul, body. At DCHOW, you will learn the proper order and why it's important to how you live your life as a child of God.

Sin: This is a biblical term that God deems is anything of the dark (the deeds of darkness and evil in the sight of God), under Satan's influence, and is contrary to the way and will of God. We are tempted to sin all of the time as sin is our default. We are to be awakened, developed, and disciplined to not give in to the temptation to sin. Jesus died for our sins, so you don't have to stay trapped. You are helped not to listen as sin is found in the various streets that keep calling your name. Pastor Piper wrote a book to help you not to listen.

T

Trials & Tribulations: This is a biblical phrase that explains to you the challenging and hard times in life.

Truth: This is a biblical term for who God is but also what you should align your life and thoughts with. Not "your truth"—that can be a mosaic of all kinds of things—but God's truth concerning you, which is rooted in what is constant - His word and love concerning you.

Trouble doesn't always last: This is a phrase said to remind and encourage you that you will get through the hard and challenging times. To know that trouble is not your end state. You can find comfort in knowing and believing that there is hope for tomorrow and better days ahead.

Tithe: This is a biblical term for what to give to God from what He has given to you. It's a way to not be governed by money or possessions, but to obey and trust God by giving Him the first of all He provides.

Trust: This is a biblical term for you to rely on who God is. This requires you to learn of His character, love, and heart towards you. He is a man who cannot lie, He is faithful where man or woman may have let you down, He can be trusted, even when a circumstance or situation doesn't look favorable to you.

Worship: To esteem God over all else—people, situations, feelings, circumstances, career, money, relationships, and you. God trumps it all and should be honored, valued, and seen as higher, greater, and Lord over it all. Worship is a heart posture and perspective that are demonstrated in life choices, daily decisions, and intentions to reflect on and lift Jesus up. Worship is also in the form of music that points to Jesus and His promises and deity, as praise that helps you magnify God over your pain, but most importantly, the melody of your life that positions your movement in His will. Jesus wants you to worship Him in Spirit and in Truth.

Worldly: This is a depiction of you before you gave your life to Jesus or the condition of your womanhood and life until you begin to grow up in spiritual maturity and become mended. Worldly is a state in which you do your own thing when you want to and the way you want to. It has its own code of feast or famine, aggression, manipulation, conniving, charming, sexuality, provocativeness, drunkenness, orgies, profanity, and a 'dog-it-dog' mentality. This is also known or referred to as darkness and sin because it is under Satan's influence.

Witness: This is a term used to describe how you live your life. If you are a witness that you have received salvation or if you have not. How you live your life and conduct yourself is a part of your witness. Think about if you're representing new life or your old one. Our witness should reveal we love the Lord and honor Him with our entire being.

Weary: This is a biblical term, as well as one you hear me use, to describe a condition of one's being. It is to be very tired, worn out, overworked, overwhelmed, fragile, fatigued, and strung out due to a variety of things. God instructs those who are weary to come to Him and learn how He does life. During the times you are weary, it can also feel like a wilderness—that of being isolated and alone.

Walk or work out your salvation: This is a biblical phrase used to remind and instruct you that you have a part to play in your life trajectory. It is for you to commit to the process of maturity and mending so that you experience mastery and life abundantly. This is you choosing to obey and practice implementing in your actions what you hear preached on Sunday or read in your Bible. When you get saved, you are to also do the work of development to be different from how you've always been.



WE BELIEVE IN YOU!

Keep this resource handy and refer back to it as often as you need. In those times that you wonder, “What does that even mean?” you can now say, “Oh yeahhhh!” When you hear these words spoken, you are able to live confidently in how it impacts you and how you navigate life. Lastly, when you begin to speak these words yourself, you are secure in the words because you also know how they are to be lived out loud.

Continue to travel your path to deliverance, development, discipleship for they awaken you to **destiny**.

It's the beauty of salvation becoming evident in your life!

Ways To Remain Connected:
